Although we had a slow start due to the wet weather in early 2024, the Parish Council, through Cllr Paul Cocker, has been busy improving the many Public Rights of Way. The pictures and descriptions show some of the work carried out.

Fitting signposts and waymarkers serves two purposes: it encourages the local community and visitors to see and use the paths for recreation and ensures the public stick to the designated footpath routes avoiding unintended trespassing.

A map has been provided on Village notice boards to show where the footpaths are. It may also be of interest to know that our footpaths link up with footpaths in adjoining Parishes - Bretherton, Little Hoole, Longton and beyond.
